WHAT'S NEXT OUR FUTURE PRIORITIES

Reducing burden on Nova Scotia business by \$25 million by 2018

Stabilizing current regulatory burden: \$1-in; \$1-out. To ensure the business community saves \$25 million in regulatory burden, the current regulatory burden must be stabilized. That means for every \$1 in new regulatory costs added, \$1 in savings (offsets) will be identified and implemented.

Net reduction in burden of \$25 million by end of 2018.

In addition to stabilizing the burden, actions will be taken across government to reduce the burden. This includes reducing or eliminating costly, outdated, duplicative or overly onerous regulatory requirements, service and process improvements to reduce the administrative burden associated with compliance.

Improving Service to Business

- Actively measuring and evaluating the Business Navigation Service to ensure it meets the needs of the business community.
- Evaluating opportunities to enhance the service experience of provincial government Inspectors.

Regional Regulatory Efficiency

- To capitalize on the significant economic opportunity associated with aligning our regulatory systems, which APEC estimated to be in the billions of dollars, our Office will continue to work on aligning additional regulatory opportunities.
- Explore other ways the region can strengthen its collaboration that both complements the Canada Free Trade Agreement and takes full advantage of the opportunities that exist within the region to bolster interprovincial commerce and trade.
